### "Open Doors" - From the Pastor

I've been thinking about Open Doors recently. On Saturday, April 27<sup>th</sup>, six of Central's youth and some parents joined me on a trip to Moravian Open Door in New York City. Here's a bit about the history of Moravian Open Door; "Beginning in 1968, the Coffee Pot drop-in shelter at First Moravian Church at the corner of Lexington Avenue and 30<sup>th</sup> Street served as many as 200 of New York City's homeless



citizens each day. With a pressing need for more shelter, in 1984 a small committee of Moravians, through the support of the Eastern District of the Moravian Church, incorporated Moravian Open Door, renovated an abandoned NY owned building, and in 1987 dedicated their new facility on 347 E. 18<sup>th</sup> St. in Manhattan. For over 35 years, Moravian Open Door has served older adults in transitional homeless setting with case management and others services."

Our youth brought, served and ate lunch with the residents and helped them with a craft project that

afternoon. As we visited, we also opened a door of our own by getting a chance to form relationships with people who outwardly might seem different than our own youth. Many of us might wonder, "What is a formerly homeless person like?"

What did we find out? The residents of Moravian Open Door are as diverse and wonderful and different as anyone we would meet anywhere. We enjoyed conversations about our churches, and I watched as youth colored and chatted with the residents, opening a door to see them as fellow human beings. These experiences teach our young people (and all of us) the importance of opening doors to allow relationships between people of different backgrounds to grow and develop.

I think about opening doors in other ways as well. I often hear about when our volunteers or staff are cleaning, practicing or working in the sanctuary or chapel that they will hear a knock on the door. They share about the wonderful experiences of opening the door to a visitor, sharing a bit about our worship space and our faith history (Thanks especially to Becky and Richard as they practice and rehearse for opening the doors to guests!). We are working toward opening more doors as we prepare for more visitors in our midst with the possibility of a World Heritage designation and I love the title that the Herrnhut community uses to welcome visitors: "Guest Ministry". We welcome guests with our Christian hospitality not knowing where our paths will intersect again or what a visit to Central will develop for their own faith journey.

Finally, I love to think about Open Doors in a world that is so filled with conversations around walls, borders and boundaries that keep people not only physically apart, but also convince us that we are fundamentally different from others. As we celebrate Pride Month this June, I am thrilled to serve a community that has been a welcoming place for members of our LGBTQ community for years and continues to welcome us each Sunday with these words; "however we identify," Central is a place for all of God's wonderfully created children. I pray that Central will continue to be a place of Open Doors, Hearts and Minds in a world that so desperately needs to be in active and loving conversation with each other.

### **Celebration of Juneteenth & Guest Preacher**

Central's Racial Justice Committee encourages us to learn more about Juneteenth and participate in the many programs being planned in the Lehigh Valley.

Juneteenth (short for "June Nineteenth") marks the day when federal troops arrived in Galveston, Texas in 1865 to take control of the state and ensure that all enslaved people be freed. The troops' arrival came a full two and a half years after the signing of the Proclamation Emancipation . Juneteenth honors the end to slavery in the United States and is considered the longest-running African American holiday. On June 17, 2021, it officially became a federal holiday.


#### **A Double Installation!**

On April 7<sup>th</sup>, it was announced that Pastor Janel, previously serving as pastor for congressional care and community outreach at Central had accepted the call to serve as Senior Pastor beginning April 8<sup>th</sup>. On May 5<sup>th</sup>, it was announced that our student pastor Josh Follweiler had accepted a oneyear call to serve as Central's Associate Pastor. Josh will be ordained on June 9<sup>th</sup>. We are so excited to celebrate with both Pastor Janel and (soon-to-be) Pastor Josh on Sunday, June 23<sup>rd</sup> as both are installed in their new roles. A reception will follow.

### Signing the Big Book

At every new members' reception, we have to remember to bring the "Big Book" over to the Sanctuary

for the new members to sign. What is the "Big Book" besides an old, big and very heavy book? It is the Moravian Covenant For



Christian Living (then called the Brotherly Agreement)

that Moravians have been agreeing to try and follow since the early days of the 18<sup>th</sup> century Herrnhut, Germany community.

On May 12, 1727, it was adopted by the Moravian Church in Herrnhut and shared with the small groups that Count Zinzendorf tried to nurture as a way that they would be able to begin to build relationships and community. Most of the Covenant deals with the Christian life, and since it is in terms of everyday life that the Christian witness is often most effectively borne, the document is subtitled "Principles by Which We Live and Bear Our Witness." We emphasize to our new members that this is not a statement of belief but a statement of the ways we are committing to carrying out the witness of our Christian faith in our everyday life. Essentially, we are signing that we will try our best to live our faith in how we live! The current version of the Moravian Covenant for Christian Living that our new members sign dates back to 1851 with the signature of Simon Rau.

### New Sanctuary and Chapel Tours and World Heritage UNESCO Updates

World Heritage Site has certainly been the buzz phrase for some time around our campus! Excitement, research, and much, much hard work has gone into the preparation of some of our Moravian historic buildings, including Central's Sanctuary and Old Chapel to be recognized as part of a transnational Moravian Church Settlements World Heritage UNESCO site.

What is UNESCO? The United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization is a specialized agency of the United Nations with the aim of promoting world peace and security through international cooperation in education, arts, sciences and culture.

If selected, we would join with Gracehill Moravian Church in Northern Ireland as well as Herrnhut Moravian Church in Germany (and their historic Moravian buildings) in this recognition. Christiansfeld Moravian Church settlement in Denmark already is designated a World Heritage UNESCO site.

To keep you up to date, here's what we know so far. Our World Heritage Council, which previously included the late Rt. Rev. Hopeton Clennon, now includes Central's representatives Diane Shaw, chair of the our History Committee and Rev. Janel Rice, as our Senior Pastor. They have also invited the Rt. Rev. Chris Giesler to join the council as a representative of world-wide bishops. We continue to meet monthly in preparation for a planned decision by the end of July. Pastor Janel has been also meeting with the pastors of the Gracehill and Herrnhut Moravian churches to share ideas about ways for our three faith communities to be prepared, and if designated, celebrate the World Heritage UNESCO status as faith communities.

Here at Central, we have fulfilled a goal of the 2022 Strategic Plan in starting the World Heritage Readiness task force. Regardless of the achievement of the World Heritage Status, we feel strongly that we want to expand the ways that guests can be welcomed to learn more about our history, architecture/buildings, and the living story of our 21<sup>st</sup> century ministries. Here are our plans starting this summer:

- 1. Beginning this June, every Friday: Old Chapel Friday Open House and Daily Text Readings, 12 - 1 p.m. Volunteers will welcome visitors, share in an explanation of the Moravian Daily Text and reading at 12:15 p.m. and offer a brief tour.
- 2. Beginning this July, every Saturday: Sanctuary tours. Similar to the tours piloted on Mother's Day weekend in May, we will begin Saturday tours of the Sanctuary, Time TBD

**Excited? Want to help?** Currently, we are discerning if we have enough visitors to expand these tours beyond the hours and dates we have planned. We would love to have you welcome visitors and also (if desired) serve as a tour guide. Talk with Diane Shaw or Pastor Janel for more information.
