From Pastor Janel

On Friday, July 26th most of us awoke to the news that the Moravian Church Settlements of Bethlehem, along with the Moravian Church Settlements in Herrnhut, Germany, Christiansfeld Denmark, and Gracehill, Northern Ireland had just received inscription as a transnational UNESCO World Heritage Site. The decision was made in New Delhi, India, where the UNESCO meetings were being held and where we were represented by a variety of delegates from Bethlehem. Mayor Willie Reynolds wrote from India saying, "Our designation is a testament to Bethlehem's incredible history of community." And Moravian University President and Central member, Bryon Grigsby, reflected of the testimony of this honor to the vision and tenacity of two Central members; Charlene Donchez Mowers, Senior Advisor & Historian, Bethlehem World Heritage

Council & Commission and also Hank Barnette, Vice-Chair of the Bethlehem World Heritage Council and Commission. Bishop Chris Giesler, who was joined with Shelia Clennon as well in India, remembered Bishop Hopeton's work and efforts in this process. Chris wrote, "While the property and buildings were the focus of the nomination, it is truly what happened within these sacred places where the outstanding universal value was to be found ... community, education, equality and faith all nurtured." The connection between the 9 historic sites and 4 ruins (see moravianchurchsettlements. org for much more information) and the living practice of the Moravian faith, continuation of traditions and sustained contributions to the building of community has been emphasized as the reasons for this World Heritage recognition.

Within Central's sanctuary, on Sunday, August 4, we had the opportunity to worship with our transnational partners on livestream and on Wednesday, August 7 we also held a brief worship before a press conference in Bethlehem. As I welcomed members and guests at both worship services, I emphasized the presence of the living faith community, first in the Saal of the Gemeinhaus, then the 1751 Old Chapel, and from 1806 onward in our church Sanctuary.

The World Heritage designation for Moravian Church Settlements has been recognized for the buildings' architecture and craftsmanship, and also in the ways that these buildings guided the Moravian ideals of community building.

Some of our context has certainly changed from 1741, but at the heart of the ministry of Central Moravian, we believe that we continue to strive to be builders and sustainers of community. This is a radically vital need in our contemporary society; bringing individuals together from diverse places and reminding them that they are a beloved and valuable part of God's creation. We must continue to ask how we are building community, through the centuries of traditions like candle-making, groups like the Busy Workers, and treasures like our music program, but also through understanding the needs of our contemporary society within our mental health teams, our food pantry and the programs of Church Family Life. We are truly grateful to be builders of community within these historic sites for over 282 years!

New Options for Children as Our 9 a.m Chapel Worship Returns!

Our 9 a.m. Old Chapel Worship service begins this September 8th with the musical leadership of Richard Miller, our Old Chapel choir, and guest musicians. Historically, this service has been slightly shorter to allow us to join Sunday School by 10 a.m. and also features a children's message. This year, there will be an optional change for our children. Following the children's message and before the sermon (around 9:30 a.m.) our children will be welcomed to be led up to the Christian Education building with our minister of music Becky Lepore to practice with the children's chime and voice choir. Archives Lecture "On Tour with the 'Nation's Guest': Lafayette in America, 1824–25"

On September 24, at 4 p.m. we are excited for Central member and Archives Board President, Diane Shaw, and retired archivist of Lafayette College to speak at the Archives on General Lafayette's "Farewell Tour" of America (on the 200th anniversary of the tour). This 1824-25 tour was an event unlike any other in American history. Fifty years after the American Revolution, America welcomed back her youngest majorgeneral with an outpouring of national affection as Lafayette insisted on spending time not just with the country's elite, but also with ordinary citizens, as well as African Americans and Indigenous Americans. Although he did not visit Bethlehem during the tour, the time he spent among the Moravians in Bethlehem in October 1777 while recovering from battle wounds was an important part of his American story. Eastern District Synod Reflections June 26 - 29, 2024

A word which we often say at Central and throughout our Moravian community continued to surface during synod, and that is *Relationships*. The relationships which were already formed were strengthened. Relationships which were new were developed into meaningful, treasured ones. This was all done in a span of three and a half days. Every report/legislation focused in some way on the importance of relationships and the essential need to be mindful of our relationships with and responsibility to all of God's children.

Worship and prayer were a major component of time spent at synod. This immersion in spirit caused us to be conscious of the importance of Spirit's role in our actions and decisions. We had an opportunity to experience how "Christ directs and unites us through His Spirit." Whatever progress was achieved was based on something beyond our individual thought.

All of the delegates were earnest, sincere, and committed, especially the youth delegates. They were clear about what they were requesting and were very impressive in their ability.

Do You Know Hope?

Do you know Hope, New Jersey? Well here is your opportunity.

Perhaps you've never been to Hope, a community settled by the Moravians in 1769, or maybe you've only passed through. On Saturday, September 21, you'll have the chance to join the Central Moravian History Committee for a closer look at the wonderful village of Hope. You will carpool to Hope and begin your tour at 10 a.m.

As a resident of Hope, I consider myself fortunate to live in, and be a steward of this picturesque, unique town. We, like Bethlehem, are one of the earliest planned communities in the nation, and as you come into town there is no mistaking that Hope was settled by the Moravians, with its many stone buildings lining almost every street.

The walking tour will start with the Gemeinhaus, now First Hope Bank. You will then see Hope's earliest Moravian farmhouse and barn, located in the center of town, and the 1769 gristmill in the "industrial section" of Hope. The Single Sister's House and School, the last building erected by the Moravians in 1803, will also be on the tour. The Hope Historical Society and Museum will be open for you. This building, built in the early 1800's, is believed to have served as the toll house for the stone bridge crossing Beaver Brook.

As a special treat, you will also have the opportunity to tour a Moravian Home built somewhere between 1780 -1800. This home is particularly unique because it hasn't been lived in since the 1950s and was probably last modernized in the 1940s. It has one cold water spigot in the kitchen and by today's standards, a very primitive electrical system. There has never been the incorporation of an indoor bathroom or a central heating system. The fact that time has stood still for this home is rare and it is soon to be at the beginning stages of restoration. Come see this home before it's restored.

One of the last stops on the tour will be God's Acre. In 1966, a marker placed by the Society of the United Brethren was "dedicated to the sacred memory of the sixty-two persons who died in the early Moravian settlement of Hope, New Jersey, between 1773 and 1808 and are buried in this cemetery."

The walking tour will last about two and one half hours with a sandwich lunch served halfway through the tour in Hope's stone Community Center, built 1841. There will be moderate hills to walk up as well as some stairs. If you have any questions, you are welcome to call Hank Naisby, 484-241-1253 or Pete Peterson, 908-798-7164.

Persons with disabilities may purchase a Day Pass for \$1 from the LANta Bus operator. And LANta buses have bike racks; ride your bike to the bus stop and take LANta to work!
