## From Pastor Janel

One of the first events of our October calendar is the Blessing of the Animals on Sunday, October 6<sup>th</sup>, at 2 p.m. on the Church Green. We don't pick this date; rather it is always the closest to the Feast Date of St. Francis, a tradition that we recently have shared with our Catholic brothers and sisters. 13<sup>th</sup> century Catholic poet, mystic and friar Francis of Assisi is probably best known for his devotion to the care of the animal world, hence a Blessing of the Animals on or around the date of his death, October 3<sup>rd</sup>. However, St. Francis is also well-known for the connection between the faith we proclaim and the actions we do, as he is reported to say, "Preach the Gospel at all times. Use words if necessary," and "The deeds you do may be the only sermon some persons will hear today."

October, like most months at Central, has no shortages of things to do outside of regular worship services on Sundays. Take a quick look through the newsletter for evidence! But rather than seeing these only as traditions, programs, or activities, what if these are also ways that we preach the gospel? Music brings us together from all walks of life to find strength and comfort for our spirits (Oct. 5<sup>th</sup> Techne Music Festival in the Chapel). We come together to understand homelessness in our community (Oct. 9<sup>th</sup> video and discussion) and raise money for the local emergency shelter (Oct. 11<sup>th</sup> dinner). We care for animals (Oct. 6<sup>th</sup> Blessing of the Animals) and the hungry (Oct. 13<sup>th</sup> CROP Walk). Each Friday and Saturday, we welcome guests with a bit of the history of Central's Chapel and Sanctuary, and a friendly greeting bearing Christ's love. And on Mondays, we gather to trim candles for the thousands who will be reminded of the promise of God's love for the world through the gift of Jesus this Christmas Eve. These are only some of the opportunities to preach the gospel by doing the deeds of Christ.

When our new members join the church on October 27<sup>th</sup>, they will sign the Moravian Covenant for Christian Living, an 18<sup>th</sup> century version of what it means to be a member of this faith community - in the deeds we do. One of the sections of the Covenant reminds us of the responsibilities of being a Christian Citizen (Article IV), living as engaged citizens within a democracy with the responsibilities of informed voting and participation in public life, but also recognizing a higher loyalty to God. During the last two Sundays in October (October 20 and 27) Pastor Josh and I will lead worship services centered around this topic. As the Moravian Church, Northern Province has taken a stand against Christian Nationalism (the identification of a human government acting with God's will only for Christians of that state), we instead turn to the Moravian Covenant to ask what it means to live as a Christian citizen, grounded in following Jesus while recognizing our responsibilities to live out God's love for all. As St. Francis prayed so long ago, may we all be instruments of God's peace, in the church and in the world as Christian citizens.

## The Annual Jeanette Barres Zug Lecture: Pious Innkeeper and Godly Tavern

The Rev. Dr. Peter Vogt will present the Zug Lecture, an offering from Historic Bethlehem Museums and Sites on Saturday October 19<sup>th</sup> at 11:30 a.m. in the Moravian Museum's Saal. Peter is Director of Theological Education in the Moravian Church, European Continental Province, and co-pastor of the Herrnhut congregation in Germany. It is well known that members of the 18<sup>th</sup> century Moravian movement traveled a lot. Less well-known but equally important was the task of welcoming and accommodating visitors who came to their settlements. With the establishments of congregational inns in almost all of their settlements, the Moravian provided an important infrastructure for travelers, both church members and outside visitors. In Herrnhut, the first inn was established as early as 1726, setting an example for all later settlements. Bethlehem, PA even had two notable inns: the Crown Inn (1745) and the Sun Inn (1758). Moravian congregational inns represented an important point of contact between the settlement and its surroundings, supporting the community in its economic life and witness of faith.

## "Preparing for End of Life" Two Presentations by the Congregational Care Committee

When a family experiences the loss of a loved one, in addition to experiencing intense grief and suffering, they are presented with overwhelming and difficult decisions. By planning your memorial service, preparing your memoir, completing your end of life documents, and making your wishes known ahead of time, you can ease the burdens placed on your loved ones.

On Wednesday, October 23 from 6 - 8 p.m., Rev. Janel Rice and Becky Lepore will guide you through choosing hymns, scriptures, and liturgies for your memorial service, and will assist you in reflecting on important moments in your life as you share your journey with God through your memoir (lebenslauf).

On Wednesday, November 13 from 6 - 8 p.m., Justin Keiper from Cantelmi-Long Funeral Home, and Rick Santee will provide helpful information to guide you in what to expect when a loved one passes away, the resources offered by a funeral home, and End of Life Planning. 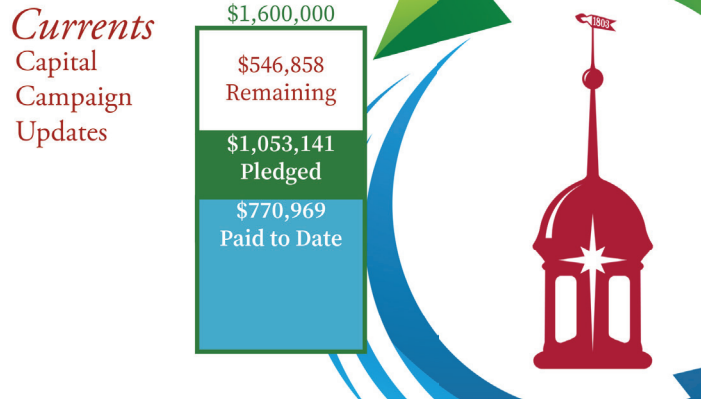

FAQ Zoom - September 30<sup>th</sup>  
October 16<sup>th</sup> Transnational Worship Celebration  
and a Chance to Welcome Guests!**

Central Moravian continues to celebrate the inscription for our Sanctuary and Old Chapel to join seven other historic Bethlehem Moravian sites, as well as the Moravian communities of Gracehill, Northern Ireland/UK, Herrnhut, Germany and Christiansfeld, Denmark as a World Heritage Moravian Church Settlement site. We also continue to make progress in planning for the welcoming of guests to our community. Pastor Janel relates to the World Heritage Council where the five institutions of either lessees or landowners of these Bethlehem sites (Bethlehem Area Moravians, Central Moravian Church, City of Bethlehem, Historic Bethlehem Museums & Sites, and Moravian University) as well as tourism and county officials. Here at Central, a new committee has been established to discuss plans for expanding our Sanctuary and Old Chapel open house hours as well as other ideas. We welcome the Rev. Dr. Betsy Miller as the chair of this new committee.

**Tours:** We are thrilled to welcome visitors not only through our worship services on Sunday but also from 2 - 4 p.m. on Fridays and Saturdays. Can you help us share a friendly welcome? ## Special October Offering Envelope

### Maintenance of Church Campus (October 27):

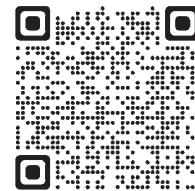
## Reduce, Reuse, Recycle & Use Less Plastic

- Install a setback thermostat. This will lower temps while you sleep and will raise it automatically just before you wake up. It takes far less energy to lower the thermostat and then raise it again, than to keep it at the same setting. And put on a sweater! It will keep you warmer than turning up the heat; this helps to conserve resources and combat climate change.
- Choose sustainable seafood. Learn how to make smart seafood choices at <https://www.fisheries.noaa.gov/topic/sustainable-seafood>
- Don't throw away those egg cartons! Donate them (cardboard containers only, please) to Central's Food Pantry. You can bring them in along with your monthly donation of non-perishable food. Thanks!
- When cooking or warming up small amounts of food, use your microwave or toaster oven instead of your larger stove oven.
- Buying a new car? Is this the time to consider an electric vehicle? Or would a gas/electric hybrid better meet your needs? Check out the latest research before you buy: <https://www.caranddriver.com/features/a60300121/electric-vs-hybrid-cars-pros-and-cons/>
- This is a good time to check to be sure you have adequate weather-stripping around your doors and windows. Lack of adequate weather-stripping can cost you \$50 or more per year in lost energy.
- Wrap your hot water heater with jacket insulation. For safety reasons, wrap only the sides of a gas tank. Wrap the sides and top of an electric tank. And, if you need to replace a hot water heater, consider a tankless hot water heater. More expensive.....but more energy efficient.
