From Pastor Janel

Doesn't it seem like November is an in-between time? The Halloween candy is still fresh, and Thanksgiving is not until the end of the month; yet every store has a full stock of Christmas merchandise out! (Of course, here at Central we start thinking about Christmas in July....)

But in all seriousness, as I write this, our nation is in an in-between time. A Presidential election is almost, but not yet. We as a nation, and we as Christians are struggling with the rise of something called Christian Nationalism. And Christian Nationalism does not exist well as an "in-between" concept nor does it live with the idea that there are many perspectives and that good people, of different backgrounds, can dialogue and disagree (and that is part of democracy).

Christian Nationalism identifies a human government with God's will and seeks privilege for Christians for that state. This vision leaves little room for dialogue or the perspectives of those of different faith, no faith or different backgrounds from the majority. This vision believes

that God ordains certain candidates and often encourages followers to blindly follow these candidates.

A recent New York Times article by David French (<https://www.nytimes.com/2024/02/25/opinion/christian-nationalism.html>) is quick to point out the value and importance of individuals using their faith and traditions to shape their values and social movements (we think of the Church's role and the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King in the Civil Rights movement). "It is not Christian nationalism if a person's political values are shaped by the individual's Christian faith. In fact, many of America's most important social movements have been infused with Christian theology and Christian activism." And yet a blanket assertion that God's will is for a Christian-led government or certain candidates only is dangerous to democracy and can easily lead to hatred, bigotry or even violence against non-Christians (or not the right kind of Christians) of all forms.

I applaud the Moravian Church Northern Province (MCNP) which recently voted to reject Christian nationalism as a distortion of the gospel of Jesus Christ; as supporting the sins and systems of racism and white supremacy; as a threat to democracy and against our Moravian Covenant for Christian Living.

Regarding civic life, the Covenant reminds us not to give up on this world, but engage in well-informing voting and support of good government; "*Considering it a special privilege to live in a democratic society, we will faithfully fulfill the responsibilities of our citizenship, among which are intelligent and well-informed voting, a willingness to assume public office, guiding the decisions of government by the expression of our opinions, and supporting good government by our personal efforts. MCCL: 4:26*

We do not hide our Christian values and Christ's call to love the neighbor, engaging in serving the hungry, homeless and those in poverty of all forms. Yet we do so in a wonderfully diverse nation; often learning, dialoguing and growing in conversations with those who are different from ourselves, as we built together a more perfect union. Entering this in-between time - an increasingly tense and threatening political climate - may we engage in our democratic duties of well-informed voting and participation in our democracy from a place of love and peace for all our neighbors.

Our Board of Elders have approved opening the Old Chapel on the day after the election, November 6 from 8 a.m. - 5 p.m., as a time for prayer and quiet meditation.

Tribal Elder of the Delaware Nation (Lenape) Visits Central

Join us on Saturday, November 2 at 1:30 p.m. in the Old Chapel for a talk by Lenape retired tribal elder and member of the Delaware tribe of Oklahoma, John Thomas. For thousands upon thousands of years, the Lenape people lived in this region, until being driven off this land by European settlers, and forced removals from the 18th and early 19th centuries. The 18th century Moravian church was engaged in mission work with the local Lenape people, working, worshipping (and being buried) alongside them in the 18th century. There are ancestral memories of the Moravian Church and their mission work, along with the accompaniment with the forced removals.

One of the federally recognized Delaware Tribes is based in Bartlesville, Oklahoma, and their retired tribal elder, John Thomas, has already made a visit in December 2023 to Bethlehem, toured the Archives, God's Acre and met with several members of Central. Now we have the opportunity on November 2 to welcome John back for a talk to hear about his experiences and following his talk, there will be the option to join Diane Shaw and John at God's Acre for a tour of several Native American graves. We hope that this conversation with John Thomas and Lenape tribe of Oklahoma can continue into a larger spring program, following the 2023 Northern Province Synod's resolution on acknowledging historic trauma and setting forward with dialogue and healing with indigenous peoples.

Some Reflections from Early Fall at Central

Children! A new way of welcoming children, both in worship, music and learning, was started between our 9 a.m. worship service, our children's choir and Sunday School. From 9 - 9:30 a.m., children (and their parents) worship together in liturgy, hymns and a children's message. Then, just before the sermon, the children are welcomed to join our children's choir with Linda de Vries and our minister of music Becky Lepore, followed by Sunday School led by Kelly Ahn. The younger ones (ages 2-Pre-K) are welcomed into a lesson and play from our Pre-K leader Robyn Endress and her assistant Ruth Ferrey. Parents have enjoyed having some time in worship to listen to the sermon and be together while their kids are learning as well. Thanks to Pastor Josh and all our leaders for putting this together - check it out if you have kids or grandchildren!

Our September 29th Children's Lovefeast brought lots of energy as children and youth of all ages helped to serve lovefeast and sing for us, remembering the historic events of August 17, 1727, when a children's awakening further influenced the early Moravian church in being led by the Spirit for mission work.

Just a week later, we loved welcoming children from the Moravian Academy community during an afternoon of World Heritage discovery with partnership from the Historic Bethlehem Museum & Sites. We welcomed families to special tours, an open house of the Chapel and Sanctuary, our Blessing of the Animals and Candle trimming demonstration. Pastor Janel spoke at all three Academy chapel services about the Church's role in the World Heritage inscription. We are excited to be working with Moravian Academy's Middle School community service program for monthly service events at Central as well.

Mental Health: In mid-September, Central Moravian Church's Mental Health Committee promoted an awareness of mental health and stigma reduction. Here's a summary from member Steve Kraweic's talk to our congregation - a crucial message on Suicide as a Disease of Despair.

"Suicide has emerged as one of the ten leading causes of death in the United States. Suicide is a *disease* of the twenty-first century. Consider two sentences: (1) He died **by** suicide; and (2) He died **from** suicide. In the first sentence the deceased is an AGENT. In the second sentence the deceased is a VICTIM. A victim of a *disease* of despair... Understanding that suicide is a disease addresses the stigma reduction that is part of the Committee's mission. We have the opportunity in this century to vanquish suicide through sensitivity, faith, and love. May it be done."

World Heritage and Welcoming more Visitors: Each Friday and Saturday, incredible volunteers have offered a warm smile and information about Central's history, architecture, traditions, and current ministries in both the Old Chapel and Sanctuary. We've had between 10 - 30 visitors each day, and we welcome new volunteers as greeters or tour guides (talk with Pastor Janel or Betsy Miller or go to tinyurl.com/centraltours). On October 16 and 17, we were honored to welcome both international guests from the three transnational Moravian Church Settlements sites as well as governmental officials, receiving the official recognition of the inscription as a World Heritage site. Our October 16th worship service is available on Central's YouTube page for viewing and features the pastors and leaders from Gracehill (Northern Ireland/UK), Herrnhut, Christiansfeld, and Central Moravian churches.

Reduce, Reuse, Recycle & Use Less Plastic

- Share your Thanksgiving feast with others.
- If you must go 'over the river and through the woods', turn down the heat and turn off the lights before you leave. And turn down the temp on the hot water heater, as well.
- Learn to love leftovers. And not just at Thanksgiving. It's estimated that nearly 40% of food in the US is wasted. According to the U.S Environmental Protection Agency, in the United States, food is the single largest category of material placed in municipal landfills, where it emits methane, a powerful greenhouse gas. Globally, food waste accounts for an estimated 8-10% of greenhouse gas emissions. According to the USDA, the average family of four in the US will lose \$1500 annually to food waste.
- If you're enjoying Thanksgiving (or other holiday meals) closer to home, bring along some food storage containers for the inevitable leftovers. This saves the host/hostess from giving up his/her own containers, or using lots of plastic wrap, foil, etc.
- Keep the fireplace damper closed when not in use; don't let your furnace heat go up the chimney!!
- Turn off the 'tech' at night and do something that doesn't have to be 'plugged in' (read a book, do a puzzle, knit, exercise...) And go to bed early; we all could use more sleep!

End of Year Reminder

As the end of the year approaches, it is the last opportunity for those over age 70 ½ to take Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs) for calendar year 2024 from their IRAs. QCDs can be an excellent way to fulfill your giving wishes and to distribute IRA funds without tax obligations.
